
We are Debt-Free

n September 25, 1853, St. Patrick Roman Catholic Church was first dedicated. On September 25, 2003, our new parish center and restored church was blessed and rededicated. And on September 26, 2009, nearly 300 parishioners joined Bishop Frederick Campbell as he celebrated a Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving for the retirement of the building and restoration debt.

In his remarks, Father André-Joseph LaCasse thanked Bishop Campbell for his presence in joining us in thanksgiving and celebration. He reminded us of how the St. Patrick Church restoration and expansion began with the vision of Fr. Carlton Jones in the early 1990s, and then progressed into a feasibility study begun by


Fr. Franze-Kelly in the mid 90s. In July 2000, the vision began to take form as Fr. Ambrose Eckinger began the project, and in the spring of 2002, the old school was razed.

Fr. LaCasse thanked the many parishioners who contributed to the "Be Thou My Vision" Capital Campaign. Fr. LaCasse said the debt would not have been paid down so quickly without the generosity of one woman, Miss Edith Keenan. When Miss Keenan passed away, she bequeathed \$200,000 to St. Patrick Church to pay down the debt.

Immediately following the Mass, those in attendance were treated to a lovely reception in Patrick Hall.

After nine years, the "Be Thou My Vision" Capital Campaign has come to an end. As Fr. LaCasse said, "may Jesus Christ and the evangelization of souls, under the patronage of St. Patrick, always be the vision of St. Patrick Church".

Respect Life Activities at St. Patrick's

he faithful from St. Patrick Church were out in full force the entire day of Sept. 23rd, participating in the 40 Days for Life, at the Abortion Mill on N. Cleveland Ave. Father LaCasse joined the group for the full rosary during the 9 a.m. hour. St. Patrick's was also blessed to have two of our parishioners. Christie MaGee and Janet Thomas, as co-chairs for the Columbus 40 Days for Life. A big thank you to Christie and Janet for defending the babies! From Catholic News Agency we learn that the 40 Days for Life autumn campaign began on Sept. 23 in 212 cities, starting efforts like prayer and fasting for an end to abortion,

peaceful vigils outside abortion facilities, and grassroots community organizing. The official effort lasted until November 1. David Bereit, National Director of 40 Days for Life, said that "tens of thousands of faithful people" participated in 45 American states, five Canadian provinces and Denmark. The

organization reports it has helped mobilize more than 215,000 people in its two years of work. Their efforts have reportedly saved 1,561 lives from abortion and have been endorsed by dozens of pro-life and

pro-family groups. Religious leaders, including more than 20 Catholic bishops, have also promoted the campaign. The fall campaign was the most widespread and longest coordinated pro-life mobilization in history. 40 Days for Life reported that 90 percent of the prayer vigil locations are at Planned Parenthood facilities. "We have never before seen the intensity of passion and extensive involvement in pro-life efforts that we are seeing all across North America right now," said

Marcus Grodi Helps Us Keep Our Kids Catholic

On November 14, Saint Patrick parish hosted Marcus Grodi as special guest speaker on the topic "Keeping your kids Catholic." Mr. Grodi (a convert to the Catholic Church and former Protestant minister) is best known for his work with the Coming Home Network International and the programs he hosts on EWTN

television and radio, but has also authored two books, contributes regularly to the monthly Catholic Answer, and frequently teaches catechetics. He is a member of Saint Thomas Aquinas parish in Zanesville (one of the "other" Dominican parishes in Ohio).

Grodi's address—sponsored by the Marriage and Family Life Ministry—included pointers from his experience on several different ways in which parents could reasonably hope to pass on the Catholic Faith to their children. Of these, the most important were that parents first be true Catholic Christians

themselves, surrendered entirely to Christ, and drawing frequently near the fountain of sacramental grace. There is no possibility of "outsourcing" the religious education of children. True, parents can never guarantee their children will believe. Faith is always a gift of God and not of parents—and it is sadly true that even when parents do all they can, their children do not believe. But

kids will never have a chance if their parents don't believe, and live, as Catholics. And parents can't simply hope that their children will see them and imitate them. They have to talk about it—and as our own Fr. Thomas pointed out—a great thing to do is something

as simple as exploiting time in the car driving home from Mass—talking about the readings, the homily, anything about the Mass. If parents are not deepening in faith and love, then they will be regressing—and so will their children.

About 115 were in attendance for the talk, which was preceded by a wonderful Italian meal provided by Gary Allwein and Mustard Seed Catering.
