After practicing law for a few years, he entered the Dominican Order in 1982, made solemn profession in 1986, and was ordained a priest in 1988. He has served as a priest and pastor for the last 29 years in Ohio and Kentucky and is currently the prior of St. Patrick Priory in Columbus, OH. In addition to parochial service, Fr. Hayes has had experience in retreat work, parish missions, pilgrimage direction, and as a spiritual director and confessor, as well as experience in Catholic radio and print media. He

has for many years been active in the Knights of Columbus and the Ancient Order of Hibernians. He is particularly interested in Holy Scripture, Sacramentology, and medieval Christian history.



A preacher of doom becomes a preacher of grace.

Dear friends,

The man with leprosy knows that he has one of the most dreaded diseases of his time. Leprosy is a slow but sure disfiguring illness, that in a way, makes someone one of the "living dead." Bereavement from family and friends, required to proclaim one's doom, suffering decay in body and mind, forced to associate only with the dying and not with the living; all of this would have a devastating effect on any person.

As we heard in our first reading, the leper is to proclaim, "Unclean! Unclean!" to everyone in his path. He is a preacher of his own doom.

And yet, at the root of our being, there is a desire to be whole. In faith, we trace this to the inherent goodness – Godlikeness - in each of us. Even though sickness and death are pervasive in human history, and in our own experience, we tend to resist them. This is more than a will to survive. It is a desire to flourish, to know the utmost happiness in our life. Every choice we make, however distorted it may be, at some level is a desire for happiness.

And the man with leprosy has this strong, inner desire to be whole again, to find happiness. A desire that does not decay along with his body.

It is this desire that moves him to stretch out his hands to Jesus. He was forbidden to come as near to Jesus as he did, but his faith based on what he had heard about Jesus led him to the feet of Jesus, where he knelt down and begged to be made whole again. Jesus, moved with compassion (literally, stirred to his guts), also stretches out his hand to touch this man who is unclean, and immediately does so: "I do will it: be made clean."

The desire of the leper reaches out to Jesus, and the desire of Jesus reaches out to the leper. Both desires meet, and a profound re-creation takes place.

This brings to my mind the image painted by Michelangelo on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel of God reaching with his finger to touch the hand of Adam, who is reaching out to him. In the painting, Adam's eyes have no pupils; they are blank. This is an artist's symbol of Adam not yet having the immortal soul and the eternal destiny that comes from God. And yet, in the painting, we see that this amazing beginning is only a moment away.

In the Gospel, the leper is also touched by God, and receives not only a new lease on life, but a whole new way of living: he ceases to be a preacher of doom and becomes a preacher of grace.

A man who is one of the walking dead is filled with new life; a man who used his voice to proclaim his own doomed state of leprosy, bad news to him and any who came too near, now uses his voice to proclaim the good news of being touched by Jesus and made whole again; a man who was banished from human society now immerses himself back into society, telling anyone who will listen that he has found the answer to his deep longing to be made whole—in the words and hand of Jesus.

A leper becomes one of the first preachers in Mark's Gospel. He preaches because he has been healed, and he cannot contain this good news.

What we can learn from the leper

How can we connect to this wonderful re-creation, this meeting of two desires, especially as we prepare to enter the holy season of Lent? How can we, too, become preachers of grace? Here are three ways:

1) I can acknowledge my brokenness, my sin, and bring it to the feet of Jesus.

Psalm 32: I acknowledge my sin; I do not cover my guilt; I confess my faults to the Lord, "and you took away the guilt of my sin."

"If you wish, you can make me clean." The leper stretches his hands out to Jesus, acknowledging exactly who he is and what burden he carries.

2) I can try to trust in the compassion and mercy of Jesus, who reaches out to me with a far deeper desire for me than mine for him.

The compassion of Jesus is expressed by a strong word in the original Greek (*splangknistheis*). Jesus reaches quite far, knowing the consequences for himself.

Jesus has come to restore us to integrity by stretching out his hand and his words to us, one person at a time. His heart moved with compassion, he says, "I do will it. Be made clean." Jesus actually touches the man—even though this was probably not permitted according to the customary laws of the day—for Jesus would be made unclean by touching someone who is unclean. But he does it anyway.

Jesus, of course, does not become unclean, but in a far deeper sense he takes on the uncleanness of all human sin: in the passion and death. Only after entering our death is his dead body raised to life.

This also happens at the Eucharist: We behold and receive the Lamb who was slain on the cross, and receive the promise of eternal life.

3) I can continue to reach out to Jesus with my heart, and with my hands.

In the Eucharist the same power is at work that raised the dead body of Jesus to life, a power that stretches out to touch us who stretch out to him in faith, especially at the Eucharist.: "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed."

I can reach out to Jesus in the Sacrament of Reconciliation: "I do will it: be made clean."

I can reach out to Jesus in the least of our brothers and sisters - in the works of mercy and almsgiving.

The reverse of a progression of disease: a progression of healing and toward a new beginning

What Jesus does by his healing power is the *reverse* of the usual progression of this disease; the reverse of our human mortality.

Jesus, help me not to be a preacher of doom, one of the living dead. Help me to approach you, lay out my sins and brokenness before you, and discover the vast desire of your heart reaching out to mine. Help me to be re-created by your grace, especially through the sacraments, so that I may find my own mortality working backwards, and giving way to my desire for wholeness, happiness, and everlasting life. Allow this life of yours, this life of grace, to be so strong in me that I cannot contain it, and allow it to spread to everyone in my path. Allow me, in this way, to be a preacher of grace.

These practices will begin on the 1st Sunday of Lent, February 18, 2024.

Days of Universal Fast and Abstinence

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of universal fast and abstinence. Anyone over the age of 18 and who has not yet reached their 60th year, is obliged to fast and abstain. Fasting is the limitation of food and drink permitting a person to eat one full meal and two smaller meals with no solid foods in between.

All Fridays of Lent are Days of Abstinence

Abstinence from meat (beast or fowl) is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent. This obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk or cheese.

Weekdays of Lent

There is no obligation to fast. However, voluntary acts of self-denial are recommended.

Easter Duty Obligation

Each of the faithful, after having received their first Holy Communion, is obliged to receive Holy Communion during the Easter season (Canon 920). This is traditionally linked to the requirement to confess grave sins at least once a year (Canon 989).

St. Patrick Stations of the Cross Fridays of Lent at 7:00 p.m.

Giving Yourself Away with Jesus at the Altar

Sometimes, it is the little things that are overlooked yet very important. As Pope Benedict XVI writes in The Sacrament of Charity; Par. 47, "The Presentation of the Gifts is not to be viewed as a kind of 'interval' between the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. This humble and simple gesture is actually very significant: In the bread and the wine that we bring to the altar, all creation is taken up by Christ the Redeemer to be transformed and presented to the Father." We are being brought to the altar as one of the gifts of sacrifice. That is why we are incensed (when incense is used): All of the gifts and the altar itself 'rise like incense before the Father.'

Most parishes include the offertory collection in the Presentation of the Gifts. This helps to symbolize that our whole life is conjoined to Jesus as He is offered to the Father on the altar. Everything we have comes from God and is returned in thanksgiving to God, especially at the Holy Mass. Yet, here is a small problem (and its solution): A popular way to contribute to the offertory collection is to do so electronically. If it is important to you to support the parish even when you are on vacation, or sick, or traveling, electronic giving is a good way to do it. But then, what do you do at the collection? Are you left out? Maybe you noticed that our offertory envelopes have a box to check - "Gave electronically." This is so that your gift, given automatically and electronically, may be included in the Holy Mass as you place an otherwise empty, but still important, envelope in the basket with that box checked. Even empty, our envelope is a gesture of sacrifice.
