PLENARY INDULGENCE IN HONOR OF THE JUBILEE OF ST. THOMAS AQUINAS

In honor of the 750th anniversary of the death of St. Thomas Aquinas on March 7, 2024, and the 800th anniversary of his birth on January 28, 2025, a Plenary Indulgence may be obtained by making a pilgrimage to a holy site connected to the Dominican Order. The faithful may obtain this indulgence by making a pilgrimage to a holy place connected to the Order of Friars Preachers, and there devoutly take part in the jubilee ceremonies, or at least devote a suitable time to pious recollection, concluding with the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and invocations of the Blessed Virgin Mary and of Saint Thomas Aquinas. Any church, shrine, or chapel currently entrusted to the Dominican Order (including St. Patrick's) can meet the requirements for the pilgrimage. The Plenary Indulgence may be gained anytime until January 28, 2025, under the usual conditions of Sacramental Confession 20 days before or after the indulgenced act, Reception of Holy Communion, Prayers for the intentions of the Holy Father, and complete detachment from sin, including venial sin.

Bringing our works into the light for revision with mercy; new hospitality volunteers initiative at St. Patrick

Dear friends,

Have you ever had to bring a writing assignment to a teacher or editor for approval and comment? We may be reluctant to do this: we put something of ourselves into our work, and criticism—even constructive—can be difficult to accept. And yet, deep down we know that revision—especially under more experienced eyes—will make it better.

In a composition class I took in college, I was surprised to learn that when professional writers write something to be published, only about 30% of their time on the project is spent on the first draft. The other 70% is spent revising it, again and again. This can often be the difference between acceptable writing and great writing.

In the Gospel, we hear that those who put the truth into action come to the light, so that their works may be revealed. Those whose works are evil hate the light because they do not want their works revealed.

We can think of our works as everything we've done this day, or this past week, or this past year. If so, most of us will realize that our works are a bit mixed. We have good works, and not so good works. But even the good ones can often improve with revision.

Think of each day of our lives as a page, and what we do each day as our writing on that page, and all the days of our life as filling a book. If we "look again" at each page, a process of re-vision, we will see ways to improve what we write the next day.

This is the reason for the longstanding practice of examining our day in the light of God. It is not a practice that is morbid or designed to fill us with guilt. Instead, it is something like revising a work of writing or art that we have created—something that already has much good in it—to make it better.

Sometimes we can become overly critical of ourselves, or discouraged by the gap between where we are and where we would like to be, especially if we keep stumbling over the same things repeatedly. We can be tempted to "take off our glasses" so as to intentionally overlook those areas that need to be brought into the light.

But the good news is that when we bring the work of our day, the work of our week, the work of our whole life before the light of the Son of God, we are bringing our work before one who is on our side; biased in our favor; one who genuinely loves us. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but have eternal life.

He wants to help us. As we heard in our second reading, God will give the spiritual strength—the grace—we need to live out the good works he has prepared for us in advance.

And he has a long track record of successful helping.

Whenever anyone we hear about in the Gospel came to Jesus with a humble heart and asked for mercy, Jesus always said yes. We need not be afraid to bring our works into the light either.

It is a good practice to examine our day, or our week, to bring it into the light of Jesus. We can do this by thinking about his love for us, a love that led him to lay down his life for us, and then letting the light of that love shine upon all what we have written on each page of our book of life. When we find something good, we can rejoice with God that he has helped us bring his light more clearly into our world. When we find something that needs improvement, we can ask for his mercy, and his strength to rewrite that "text" or that "sentence" the next time.

For example, is there a sentence or phrase that we keep putting in that does not really belong; that doesn't fit with the aim of our life? In other words, are there distracting or even hurtful patterns in our life that we need to let go of? On the other hand, maybe we have a great idea on our page that needs to be developed, expanded upon, made more vivid? In other words, we can see the good things, actions, or people in our life that we want to give ourselves to in a greater way.

It is also good to receive the help of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, where we can receive forgiveness for whatever we may have done, and the grace that will help us truly do our best work and live in the light of God.

In this way, when we finish writing the book of our life, and present our book to God—a book he has helped us revise and improve—he will read a story that becomes ever more familiar as the pages are turned, a story of selfgiving love, a story that reminds him of his only Son who came not to condemn, but to save.

HOSPITALITY VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

To make St. Patrick's an even more welcoming parish – to our visiting guests (Catholic and non-Catholic), new parishioners and existing parishioners – the parish will be implementing a *Hospitality Initiative* later this spring and summer. In addition to enhanced facility signage and printed materials, a team of Hospitality volunteers is being formed. <u>Please prayerfully consider serving on this</u> <u>Hospitality team – we need 20+ volunteers</u>.

Hospitality volunteers will be stationed in Patrick Hall and the East entrance/Gallery area, will welcome our parishioners and guests, and answer questions regarding the parish, its facilities, Mass at St. Patrick's, parish/CCD registration, etc. Volunteers will also enhance the security of our parish by identifying any suspicious individuals or behavior and reporting it to the parish security team.

Volunteer shifts will be before and after all weekend Masses, and during Mass for a couple of the Sunday Masses (9:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.) Duration of a shift will be between 20 minutes and an hour. Scheduling will be flexible; the frequency of your scheduled shifts will depend on the number of volunteers.

Hospitality volunteers (men and women are welcome) must be registered parishioners, age 18+ and compliant with Protecting God's Children (if not PGC compliant, the parish will help with that process). Volunteers will need to attend an April training session.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of Fast and Abstinence (ages 18-59).
