

A new book about our patron, Saint Patrick; the desire to see Jesus

Dear friends,

This year, Saint Patrick's feast day falls on a Sunday of Lent, which outranks even the celebration of a parish's patronal feast, so we received permission from Bishop Fernandes to transfer our celebration of our patron to March 16 (and thus our solemn Vigil celebration on the evening of March 15) so that we could give due honor to him at Mass.



I was happy to discover that prominent Catholic author, Mike Aguilina, has recently published a new book about our patron: St. Patrick and His World (Scepter Publishers, 2024.) Aguilina brings to this easy to read (and hard to put down) book a wonderful balance: a careful review of the historical sources on the one hand and a deep appreciation for the life and lasting legacy of a saint who so effectively brought the Catholic faith to Ireland on the other. It isn't easy to write a history of a saint who is the only eyewitness to the entire fifth century of Ireland - whose writings still remain with us. While St. Patrick has two works that are unmistakably his own-his Letter to the Soldiers of Coroticus and his Confession—his massive popularity and the relatively late date of other writings about him make it notoriously difficult for historians to distinguish the factual underpinnings of the many stories about him from fanciful additions later on.

In some ways, we know very little about St. Patrick. We don't even know when he was born, when he came to Ireland, or when he died. Various sources give us all those dates, but they give us different dates.

In another way, though, we know everything that's really important about St. Patrick. We know him from the inside—how he thought and how he felt. We know him because he put his heart and soul into his own writings. Those writings are a terrible frustration for historians, because Patrick never mentions dates and doesn't see the point of sticking to a chronological order. But for those of us who want to know the inner heart of a saint, the whole man is there in what he wrote.

Aquilina has done his research, without making his book overly academic. He has authored a concise (136 pages), engaging, down-to-earth, and yet inspiring portrait of St. Patrick that helps us come to know and relate to him more deeply than before.

Here is an excerpt from the book:

As he prayed, Patrick began to undergo a deep conversion. He recognized the sins of his former life, and he was grateful to God for the opportunity to detach himself from them. He saw his present difficulties as a blessing.

Now, after I came to Ireland, tending flocks was my daily occupation; and constantly I used to pray in the daytime. Love of God and the fear of him increased more and more, and faith grew, and the spirit was moved, so that in one day [I would say] as many as a hundred prayers, and at night nearly as many, so that I used to stay even in the woods and on the mountain [to this end]. And before daybreak I used to be roused to prayer, in snow, in frost, in rain; and I felt no hurt; nor was there any sluggishness in me—as I now see, because then the spirit was fervent within me.

Six years passed this way. Patrick developed a deep intimacy with God the Trinity. Patrick saw this intimacy as a grace—and it was. But grace builds upon nature. His experience of prayer in the cold nights of Ireland is a tribute, too, to the lessons his parents and the town clergy had tried to instill in him. Something stuck.

You can order *St. Patrick and His World* as a paperback or e-book from Scepter Publishers or from Amazon for \$15.95. This would be a great way to enter the life and world of our holy patron, so that he can be more present in ours.

As the author notes:

* * *

As St. Patrick was drawn to God in the long silences of his life as a slave and a shepherd, so in today's Gospel some Greek pilgrims are drawn to God in Jerusalem during the tumultuous feast of Passover, and said to Philip, We would like to see Jesus.

Jesus attracts us, draws us to himself. He provides a motive to follow him that is stronger than the inertia that mires us in lesser things, to things that cannot deliver what they promise.

Some Greeks, converts to Judaism who had come to Jerusalem for the Passover, were drawn to Jesus. They told Philip that they would like to see Jesus. Why did they want to see him? Perhaps they had heard of the healings he had done, the miracles he had worked, the man named Lazarus he had raised from the dead.

But Jesus gives a strange answer to this request to see him, relayed to him through his disciples Philip and Andrew. In effect, he tells them that he cannot be truly seen for who he is until he is lifted up on the cross. Even though his signs have already begun to draw many people to him, when he is lifted up he will draw *everyone* to himself.

He draws everyone to himself by being lifted up on a cross in an hour of desolation and pain. This is a strange way of drawing everyone, for this seems more of a defeat than a victory, more an embarrassment than a glory. Yet in the heart of this desolation there is glory, because when everything else is stripped away, there is something that cannot be conquered: a love stronger than death. It is that love that attracts us, draws us to him. It is this strange combination of suffering and glory that imprints itself on our heart, and does not leave us.

How, then, do we see Jesus?

Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will my servant be.

When we pray the Stations of the cross, we following Jesus in his suffering for us. And yet, even though we see his suffering, we are drawn towards him, because we see that he suffers because of his love for us.

For example, consider the sixth station of the cross: Veronica meets Jesus on the way, and wipes his face with her veil. This small act of kindness leaves an imprint of the face of Christ on her veil.

We are Veronica: we have each been given an image of Christ to keep, to hold dear, written on our hearts.

A face that draws her.

A face that is weary, the face of a man whose life is slipping away. Despite all of this, his is a face that somehow still draws her to him, in the violence and chaos of the execution. There is a gentleness, a welcome, that is irresistible.

Why? We see in him our weakness, our failure, our chaos. But we also see in him an unconquerable spirit—for we sense that there is something unconquerable in us, too. Something even death cannot conquer, or time erode. It is an unconquerable love, stronger than death, that cannot be corrupted. A love, in fact, that reverses corruption, and renews, restores to innocence.

A face that forgives.

A face that is mocked and crowned with thorns, but responds with mercy. As we heard in the first reading, to be forgiven is to know God: "All, from least to greatest, shall know me, says the Lord, for I will forgive their evildoing and remember their sin no more." This new covenant takes away our sins—and helps us know God.

When Jesus is lifted up on the cross, he overthrows the rule of Satan over the world. Jesus also breaks our own bonds—whatever holds us back from knowing and loving God.

A face that inspires courage to follow.

A face that is beaten, but not conquered. Jesus learned obedience through what he suffered—in his human nature—and has become the source of eternal salvation for all who obey *him*. We don't need to blaze a new trail. We need only to follow the one who has already found the way.

In this image, imprinted on Veronica's veil, and indelibly on her heart, is the new covenant, a covenant of infinite mercy, a covenant that burns through all false images of God. For this *is* the face of God.

If we walk with Christ on his way to the cross, in his hour of suffering, if we try to console him as Veronica did or help him as Simon did, we will be given a renewed image of God that will sustain us, and give us courage to follow. We will see Jesus.

If we look, we will see the face of Jesus all around us. That strange but attractive combination of weakened but unconquered.

In the smile of a handicapped young man being pushed by his mother in a wheelchair.

In the confident eyes of a grandmother or grandfather praying, year after year, for their children and grandchildren who have drifted away from their faith.

In the welcome one family gives to someone new in our parish, even if they feel alone and new themselves.

Even when we see suffering, we see the beginnings of glory, we see an unconquerable love.

We sometimes feel stuck. Inertia makes it difficult to step forward, to keep going, to take delight in following the way of Christ.

What is it in our lives that holds us back from truly seeing and knowing Jesus?

In these last weeks of Lent, let us ask Jesus to help us recognize him and know him in our own lives, so that we may be *drawn* to him, be *forgiven* by him, and be inspired with the *courage* to follow him with abandon.

PASSIONTIDE AND THE VEILING OF IMAGES

The first several weeks of Lent are focused on Christ's fasting and temptation in the desert, with lessons urging the faithful to practice self-denial and ongoing conversion. Today on the Fifth Sunday of Lent, the season takes a dramatic turn. Traditionally, the Fifth Week of Lent and Holy Week are known collectively as "Passiontide," as the prayers and readings of the liturgy start to focus directly on Christ's coming Passion and death. One way Passiontide is typically observed is the veiling of all crosses and statues in the church, which we do at St. Patrick's. Part of this is penitential – the sorrow of these days makes us cover any signs of joy, such as sacred art. Another part of this practice is preparatory crosses are covered from now until Good Friday, when the cross will be lifted high and unveiled by the priest for all the people to venerate during the Celebration of the Lord's Passion. Likewise, statues are covered until the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday, when they will be seen again in the light of the Paschal candle.

HOSPITALITY VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

To make St. Patrick's an even more welcoming parish – to our visiting guests (Catholic and non-Catholic), new parishioners and existing parishioners – the parish will be implementing a *Hospitality Initiative* later this spring and summer. In addition to enhanced facility signage and printed materials, a team of Hospitality volunteers is being formed. Please prayerfully consider serving on this Hospitality team – we need 20+ volunteers.

Hospitality volunteers will be stationed in Patrick Hall and the East entrance/Gallery area, will welcome our parishioners and guests, and answer questions regarding the parish, its facilities, Mass at St. Patrick's, parish/CCD registration, etc. Volunteers will also enhance the security of our parish by identifying any suspicious individuals or behavior and reporting it to the parish security team.

Volunteer shifts will be before and after all weekend Masses, and during Mass for a couple of the Sunday Masses (9:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.) Duration of a shift will be between 20 minutes and an hour. Scheduling will be flexible; the frequency of your scheduled shifts will depend on the number of volunteers.

Hospitality volunteers (men and women are welcome) must be registered parishioners, age 18+ and compliant with Protecting God's Children (if not PGC compliant, the parish will help with that process). Volunteers will need to attend an April training session.

What is the Easter Duty Obligation?

Each of the faithful, after having received their first Holy Communion, is obliged to receive Holy Communion during the Easter season (Canon 920). This is traditionally linked to the requirement to confess grave sins at least once a year (Canon 989).

What is Fast and Abstinence?

Fasting is the limitation of food, allowing a person to eat one full meal and two smaller meals, with no solid foods eaten between meals. The two smaller meals combined should not exceed the amount eaten at the full meal. All Catholics over the age of 18 and who have not yet completed their 60th year are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Abstinence prohibits the eating of meat (beast or fowl), though eggs, milk, and cheese are permitted. All Catholics 14 years old and older are obliged to abstain on Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday.



Ohio is blessed with 301 Catholic K-8 schools and 72 Catholic high schools across the state with a good number of them in Central Ohio. 
