

#### Saint Joseph and His World

Dear friends,

Last week, I recommended a book by Mike Aquilina about St. Patrick (*St. Patrick and His World*, Scepter Publications, 2024). This week, I'm recommending another book by Mike Aquilina about St. Joseph, whose feast we celebrated this past week: *St. Joseph and His World* (Scepter Publications, 2020).



As in his book on St. Patrick, Aquilina brings to another great saint a great combination of attention to centuries of scholarship and respect for historical sources on the one hand, and a wholeheartedly Catholic approach to the saint chosen by God to be the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus Christ on the other. We hear about the fascinating connections between the life of Joseph and the life of King Herod the Great; the history of the very small and (at the time) recently founded town of Nazareth; the work, tools, and reputation of carpenters in the time of Joseph; and what life would have been like in Nazareth and in Egypt. On a more spiritual plane, we read about the Jewish marriage customs of Joseph's time, and three theories of why Joseph initially planned to divorce Mary guietly when he discovered that she was pregnant with a child who was not his own. We hear about the great devotion to angels in first century Judaism, and how this connects to Joseph's dreams. We learn about what Joseph's and Mary's journeys would have been like—fleeing from Herod to Egypt, and years later the pilgrim's journey to Jerusalem for Passover when Jesus was twelve—when he unexpectedly stayed behind in the Temple while Joseph and Mary anxiously searched for him for three days.

As Aquilina writes in his introduction,

"To sketch St. Joseph, an author must use something like the painterly technique of *chiaroscuro*. An artist depicts the surrounding shadows in order to accentuate the objects caught in a small shaft of light. The figure comes into focus because he is defined against the surrounding darkness. (It is certainly no accident that some of the masterpieces of chiaroscuro are images of St. Joseph.) A man like St. Joseph can become indistinct when we talk too much about him. In this book, I want to talk about his world: the society and culture of the Judean kingdom, the workplaces where he practiced his craft, the villages that he called home."

Reading this book brings us much closer to the world of St. Joseph. I came away with an impression both of his humanity and at the same time of his courage and practical wisdom in the face of great difficulties, especially the depravity, violence, and madness of King Herod, who sought the life of his foster son.

Aquilina concludes his book with a brief reflection on Joseph as an excellent model of the virtue of prudence. Joseph's decisions and actions faced reality with downto-earth humility and great strength of faith:

"Reality is something that must be faced squarely, deliberately, consciously, with the means God has provided—first, the inner reality of one's own self and then the reality of the world. Joseph can be misunderstood, as prudence is misunderstood. His silence can be mistaken for passivity, but it is not. Joseph is the prudent man whose thoughts correspond to reality, and whose actions flow from those thoughts. He is the image of God and yet a model for every Christian. He is the one who keeps the constant company of Jesus Christ."

This book can be a great way to draw closer to such a great friend of God.

THE LIGHT OF CHRIST: Light is an important aspect and theme of the Church's Easter Vigil liturgy. Light unfolds gradually at different parts throughout the Mass. We begin outdoors with the Lucernarium, when the new Easter fire is blessed. From this blessed fire, all candles will be lit. The first candle to be lit is the Paschal candle, which is the first and only light to enter the church at the beginning of the Vigil. But the light of the Paschal candle is soon passed to the candles of the faithful, and the great Easter Proclamation, the Exsultet is sung. Then, we listen to readings from the Old Testament, not in total darkness, for "some lights are lit throughout the church" (Roman Missal, The Easter Vigil). This signifies that God gradually revealed the light of His Word throughout history, but it was incomplete until the coming of Christ. Finally, at the *Gloria*, when the organ and bells return, all the altar candles are lit, signifying Christ's triumph over sin and death. The darkness is completely scattered by the light of the Risen Christ!

#### GOOD FRIDAY IS AN OBLIGATORY DAY OF FAST AND ABSTINENCE

Fasting is the limitation of food, allowing a person to eat one full meal and two smaller meals, with no solid foods eaten between meals. The two smaller meals combined should not exceed the amount eaten at the full meal. All Catholics over the age of 18 and who have not yet completed their 60<sup>th</sup> year are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Abstinence prohibits the eating of meat (beast or fowl), though eggs, milk, and cheese are permitted. All Catholics 14 years old and older are obliged to abstain on Good Friday.

#### PONTIFICAL GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION

Pope Francis has asked our support for Christians in the Holy Land through the Pontifical Good Friday Collection. Stand in solidarity with the Church in the Holy Land as a witness of peace, supporting Catholics in parishes and schools there, maintaining Christian shrines, and caring for refugees in the Holy Land.

## Little Margaret's Charity: Helping Those in Need Fifth Sunday Collection - Next Weekend!

**Some background:** Inspired by Saint Margaret of Castello, O.P., the ministry known as **Little Margaret's Charity** has served as St. Patrick's charitable arm for over fifteen years.

**Fifth Sunday Collections:** Four times a year, during the months which include a fifth Sunday, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Collection at all Masses benefits Little Margaret's Charity.

**Poor Box:** Funds dropped in the poor boxes in the church also support the various causes of Little Margaret's Charity.

Donations to Little Margaret's Charity through the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday Collection and the Poor Box support parishioners in need, as well as a number of Pro-life organizations, including Ohio Right to Life, Greater Columbus Right to Life, Women's Care Center, PDHC, and Bethesda Healing Ministry. The poor and homeless of downtown are also aided by contributions to the Holy Family Soup Kitchen, Faith Mission, J.O.I.N., and the Community Kitchen.

Little Margaret's Charity also sponsors the annual **Giving Tree** at Christmas. The 2023 Giving Tree campaign enabled us to help 15 families, a total of 68 individuals, enjoy a little brighter Christmas. Parishioners donated over \$4,000 in gift cards, and nearly \$5,000 in cash, to assist these parish families.
