

5 t. Patrick Church celebrated the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, the Body of Christ, on Sunday June 14 with a Mass followed by a solemn procession around the church. Many altar servers were in attendance, and processed toward the altar accompanied by the Knights of Columbus, who were dressed in their full regalia.

Fr. LaCasse began his homily by reminding us that the Eucharist is the greatest gift in our spiritual life. He also took the opportunity to introduce St. Patrick's new parochial vicar, Fr. Thomas Blau, O.P, who was greeted with a round of applause from the parishioners. Fr. spoke about the origins of Corpus Christi in the 13th and 14th centuries as well as the processions that began in the

middle ages. He hoped that our own procession wouldn't be rained on. Praise God, it wasn't!

Father encouraged us to spend more time in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, and to be well disposed to receive the Eucharist. He spoke of the great blessing, that Christ would select imperfect men to bring his Body and Blood—Soul and

Divinity to His Church. Father encouraged us all to pray that our young men will respond to the call of the priesthood.

Following Mass, the parishioners were invited to process around the outside of the Church following behind the Blessed Sacrament as it was held high in the monstrance. The St. Patrick's choir led us in beautiful song. Even as the silence was interrupted by a passing semi, the Presence of Christ was evident—the truck driver mouthed an apology as he passed by. After entering the Church, we recited the Divine Praises and completed our celebration with Benediction.

University of Akron [Go Zips!] for his undergraduate studies, and began getting interested in "things of faith" within his first year there. After working in campus ministry at UVA he had a number of jobs including a postal worker, a gradeschool teacher, various positions for a drug store chain, and a few odd jobs. Eventually Fr. Thomas would live in Honduras, Guatemala, and Mexico doing missionary work.

Upon returning to the U.S. he attended Franciscan University of Steubenville and earned an MA in theology. It was at FUS that Fr. Thomas met his first Dominican. He was hooked, and entered the Order's novitiate in 1993. Fr. Thomas completed the normal seminary coursework and received his M.Div, and STL [degree in theology] from the Dominican House of Studies in Washington DC. This conference was geared to address the resources and



Catholic Youth Summer Camp

iat voluntas tua (Let it be done unto me) was the theme for this year's CYSC. The words of the Blessed Mother, "Your Will be done" were inscribed on the top of every page in the teen's daily prayer journals. The first page of their journals contained the "Song of Patrick"—"...God's way is my way, God's shield is round me..."

CYSC celebrated it's 9th year of providing high adventure camps, challenging our young people to "Live the Adventure" of their Catholic faith. Over 400 high school and middle school campers participated in the three weeks of CYSC, along with 75 counselors and staff members. St. Patrick parish sent 67 kids. "Never Grey"—the St. Patrick High School Youth Group band performed each night for one of the middle school camps. The band also played during daily Mass. Bob Moraine, the camp director and founder said, "Our Club program is really the heart and soul of why we're here."

Molly Newman, a 17-year-old parishioner provided an emotional testimony. Molly wrote "I would like to express how much I think camp has made an impact on my life. Granted I've only been home for a week, but I've said a rosary everyday and I've been trying to watch the things I say and do way closer. Camp is a beautiful experience that I think everyone would benefit from. It's like every retreat I've ever been on, times about a thousand. It's a safe bubble from the rest of the world, almost like rehab for the soul. I just think that if I could get this much from it when I was falling away from the church, then it must really have God's fingerprints all over it. It's a moment of clarity in a world of confusion. The staff that they have chosen to run the camp seemed to have been hand picked by God himself. This particular year was dedicated to Mary and it gave me a new appreciation for her that I never had before. She plays

such a role in the story of salvation. I don't know about other people, but it was a role I tended to overlook. I know I

was not the only one moved by this beautiful experience, it was evident that there was a major change in the entire camp's disposition from the time we arrived to the time we left."

CYSC is a high adventure camp that includes many activities and faith programs. Every day the youth experienced the excitement of activities such as mountain biking, horseback riding, archery, hiking, jet skis, climbing wall, high ropes, canoeing, and tubing. Each evening they participated in Catholic faith programs that included daily Mass, Eucharistic Adoration, Confession, inspiring talks, teen testimonies, funny skits, moving dramas, along

with small group sessions, praise and worship. Bob Moraine said, "Our byline is 'live the adventure' and the whole idea is that we try to offer high adventure activities to build a high adventure faith. It's the activities that attract the kids, but our primary motivation is to evangelize, catechize, and help them grow in their faith."

This Catholic camp is aligned with the goals and components of youth ministry as set forth in "Renewing the Vision" (the Catholic Church's blueprint for the continued development of effective ministry with young and older adolescents published by the USCCB, 1997). CYSC seeks to enhance and support parish based youth ministry and catechetical programs. Dan DeMatte, (St. Patrick Church, Director of Religious Education and Youth Ministry) has been involved with CYSC from its beginning. He stated, "As a parish youth minister, I love getting as many of our teens to go to Catholic Youth Summer Camp as

possible. The teens that attend camp not only encounter the Lord in a tremendous way, but they also become


