40th Year Marching to Defend Life

On January 25th, 2013, over half a million people, most carrying signs protesting abortion, marched through the streets of Washington D.C. up to the Supreme Court building. Halfway through this year's March for Life, it started to snow. Everyone was tired and cold and wanted to rest, but they kept marching. Why did they do this? Everyone, including all those who had traveled on the St. Patrick's bus (of which I was blessed to be a part, for my


3rd year in a row) was protesting abortion and standing for the rights of the unborn human baby. There was no violence. The only sounds were those of the snow crunching underfoot and the chants of "Hey hey, ho ho, Roe v. Wade has got to go!" and "We love babies, yes we do! We love babies, how 'bout you?". The banners and signs that people carried said things such as "40 = 55M", "I survived the American holocaust", and, of course, the well-



known Dr. Seuss quote, "A person's a person, no matter how small". This was an important year for the March for Life because it was the 40th anniversary of the year when abortion was made legal. In the Bible, 40 is a significant number that symbolizes a time of wandering and testing. This is what the past 40 years have been for our country: a time of wandering in the desert of confusion over what exactly constitutes a human life and testing of the pro-life community while the war against life appears to intensify. Exodus 20:13 says, "You shall not kill". Maybe 2013, the number of this Exodus verse, is the year in which babies will be given back the unalienable right to life. That is what we were all silently praying for during this year's March for Life.

The St. Patrick's bus left for the March for Life on the 24th of January after sunset. We took a red eye bus to Washington D.C. and arrived at the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception just as the sun was rising on the morning of the 25th. Upon our arrival, after cleaning up, we were just in time

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for a beautiful Holy Hour for Life and Morning Prayer down in the Crypt Chapel, in the undercroft of the Basilica. We also were able to attend mass; held in the undercroft. However, we were unable to attend the Basilica mass as it was already full to standing room only by the time the Holy Hour ended - how amazing to see the church literally overflowing with people praying for the end of abortion!! After mass, my friend and I lit candles in front of a beautiful statue of the Infant of Prague. We were praying for energy and perseverance to make it through the day, as we were feeling very physically exhausted at that point! We then were able to tour the Basilica's many amazingly beautiful chapels and shrines. Each little Marian chapel seemed more beautiful than the last one. Finally, we ate breakfast, which definitely gave our energy levels a much needed boost. We went to the restrooms to put on long underwear and multiple layers for warmth and then headed off to take the subway to the pre-March rally at the National Mall. We found a spot surrounded by dozens of our dear Dominican friars and sisters and listened to many amazing pro-life speakers. After that the 2013 March for Life began. It was

apparent to me that this was the largest March for Life in the three years I have attended. We moved really slowly, at times not walking for up to five minutes. It is always amazing to me to see the number of young people at the March. There were a lot of groups from different high schools, colleges and churches around the U.S. that came to stand for an end to abortion. Numbers show that the youth is the fastest growing pro-life group in our country. Today's young people are often depicted as being self-centered, shallow and

materialistic. All of these young people could have been doing many things other than traveling to D.C. and walking through the freezing snow for hours - but they took time out of their life and chose to come and support human life. It gives me great hope that so many young people decided to do this year after year. These

overwhelmingly young people seem to understand the gift that human life is in a special and deep way, perhaps feeling the loss of the 33% of our generation that have been lost to abortion. If the number of young people attending the March for Life and praying for an end to abortion continues to increase, I am confident that abortion will end during my lifetime. I am so very thankful to be at a parish like St. Patrick's, so deeply committed to the cause of Human Life, and allowing me to go on trips like this will be etched in my mind forever. \blacksquare

My soul yearns for God more now than ever.

Thank you for all of your prayers leading up the Easter Vigil, I can ensure you, I could feel them and it was like nothing else I have ever experienced. I will be sure to keep all of you in prayers. May God Bless you all. \(\blacktriangleright)

Annual St. Patrick Day Celebration



A lively St. Patrick Day Celebration was held once again this year at our parish! The evening began with a beautiful Mass honoring St. Patrick, our patron saint. Celebrant for the Mass was Very Rev. Brian Mulcahy, O.P., the Prior Provincial for the Dominican Province of St. Joseph from New York City, and also in attendance was Fr. Benedict Croell, O.P., Director of Vocations from Washington, DC, Dominican novices from St. Gertrude's Parish in Cincinnati, and Dominican sisters from St. Michael's Church in Worthington.

During mass, our parish choir performed Irish inspired hymns which added a lovely element of solemnity to the service. Mass concluded with a statue of St. Patrick being carried via a torch lit procession outside, while flanked by an arrangement of Irish pipes and drums.




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St. Patrick Paschal Candle Imagery

I am but cleanse me in Thy Blood; Of which a single drop, for sinners spilt, Can purge the entire world from all its guilt".

The mandorla surrounding Christ is ringed in flames and topped with three shamrocks and two Celtic knots, honoring both the Trinity and the Irish roots of our parish. The Alpha and Omega follow the same pattern of Celtic influence with a peacock (sign of eternity) and doves (sign of peace). Reminiscent of the new Eden, panels of riotous flowers and crowned shields representing the King flank each side of the mandorla.

In the center another shield contains the Dominican Cross. Instead of a crown, on the top of this shield lays the "Lamb as if slain", whose victory is noted by his banner. Finally the base of the candle, "Worthy is the Lamb..." proclaims the opening antiphon for the Mass on the Feast of Christ the King and ties together the images of the Lamb on the Cross and Christ King, ruler of all. \blacksquare
